
## **Proposed Change of Venue**

### Meet the team: President John Worcester

John was born in Hawthorn, Melbourne, in December 1940 and describes himself as a "war baby" but never a "baby boomer"! He enjoyed a very settled lifestyle with two very caring parents, Les and Addie (Leslie and Adelaide) and two younger sisters. His school was Glenferrie Primary in Manningtree Road, Glenferrie, where his father and his father's two sisters had attended in the first decade of the 20th century (sat in the same class room as his Dad had) and later was delighted to enrol his own son and daughter there.





her first job. Both Adelaide and her brother, Bevis, eventually gained government jobs in Canberra which later became a big incentive for John to move house (traumatic down-sizing) and shift to Canberra in 2018 (four grandchildren – aged now from 8 to 13).

John went to Camberwell High School through the 1950s (by tram - which helps explain his enthusiasm for a tram to Woden!) He later taught at his old school and at a time when his son, Bevis, was also a student there. John served on the School Council and was a mover behind the school's Golden Jubilee. John helped set up an ex-student association (called "CHESS)" and occasionally takes part in annual dinner plus on-line Zoom meetings.

The move away from Ferntree Gully was traumatic after more than 30 years in a lovely 5-bedroom 2-storey house with views over playing fields to Mt Dandenong. He had four sheds. So much "stuff" had to be given away, the rest filling a 12-cubic-metre skip). John misses his garden and, in Canberra, has a balcony with lots of plants in pots, many of which he brought up to Canberra. John lives in Narrabundah next door to the Macedonian Church, in a complex called "Milson", a 62-unit complex set in beautiful gardens, park-like with a swimming pool much loved by his grandchildren. He enjoys wonderful views from his balcony (paddocks, bushland and Mt Mugga Mugga). His unit provides a 10-metre-long wall for his bookshelves (thousands of books), plus his extensive collections of LPs and CDs.

His study doubles as a recording studio for preparing radio programs for three Melbourne stations as well as his weekly Friday afternoon program on ArtSound-FM in Canberra (92.7 and also the third Sunday each month, also 2pm till 4pm). In the early 1950s, John took part regularly in a radio quiz program for school students, probably helping spark his life-long fascination for radio.

John's other local interests are attending weekly U3A music classes at Wesley Music Centre – and, of course, Probus Narrabundah Club (founder member and President for the last two years). John has been active in the Lake View Book Club at the National Library for about 12 years (including his regular visits to see family in Canberra). He continues to be active politically (as he has since the age of ten). In the 1970s, John was active in the development of Australia's small but influential Australia Party, retiring as National Convener in 1976. He says aspects were "heady", for example in Canberra delivering press releases to the Press Gallery and giving a well-attended press conference seen all over Australia on television.

In the 1960s while teaching at Braybrook High School, John initiated and presented schoolground broadcasts of programs of classical music each lunchtime. When a community radio station for classical music lovers was mooted, John became involved. This was 3MBS, first of all of Australia's community radio stations, and now a highly valued organisation in Melbourne's music community. John is the longest-serving volunteer there (since 1975) and still presents an "Organ & Choral" program every 3 months.

John spent several terms as 3MBS President and as a Board Member, retiring in Nov 2014 after a critical time turning around the station's finances. He headed up the Policy Committee as well as the station's Quality & Standards Group. In the 1980s, John had initiated working groups to develop the station and his work resulted in turning around a 9-year decline in subscription finances.

John spent many years running the Community Broadcasting Association of Victoria, the peak body for all Victorian community radio stations, including promotional events and training seminars. When John finally retired from the Committee in November 2014, he was delighted and honoured to be presented with a framed certificate for Life Membership of the organisation.

In 1994, just before transmissions commenced for community television in Melbourne, John became involved with one of the constituent groups in the Melbourne Community Television Consortium and as its president conducted training sessions and produced a weekly eastern suburbs news program that was aired on "Channel 31" (directed and presented by John, assisted by his two children). John spent 4 years as President of MCTC (2000-4) including when the station got its first permanent broadcasting licence. In 2005, John founded a new TV group, as part of the Consortium, called "Metro-TV".

Following retirement from teaching, John joined the staff of Melbourne ethnic broadcasting station 3ZZZ as its manager and ran three successive very successful fund-raising radiothons (1995-1997) which, he notes, have been on a plateau ever since! He "grew" them by 7%, 7% and then 10% by developing a subtle competitive approach. When he retired from that job, John became involved with the station's Irish Group, and continues to broadcast a news-based program for the Irish community in Melbourne every three months. John was elected to the 3ZZZ governing Council and spent 6 very active years with the Programming Committee (2000 to 2006).

John also organised periodic forums for ethnic broadcasters not just from 3ZZZ but also from Melbourne's stations with ethnic programming. At 3ZZZ, John often took an ethnic broadcasters' Training Program.

In 1998, John was invited to present a program on newly-licensed suburban radio station, 3WBC, covering the suburbs of Whitehorse and Boroondara. John still prepares and presents a program, twice each month and organises a team of 3 people presenting "Roundabout". John was a member of the Committee at 3WBC for several years, including time as President. When the station was unable to put together its 5-year licence renewal application, John successfully took it on including giving undertakings for improved performance. In 2015, John completed a third successful licence renewal. John was delighted and honoured to be made a Life Member of 3WBC in August, 2014, receiving a framed certificate and a medallion.

Following his first "retirement job", John worked for the Australian Education Industry Centre as a trainer, compliance officer and site manager. For 3WBC's radiothon, John was able to use his shopfront in Mount Waverley as a call centre. Later, when running a "Work For the Dole" program in Box Hill, his participants undertook all the analysis required for the 3WBC licence renewal.

Thinking of early family history in Melbourne, it's interesting that the Worcester family arrived from London in1839 when Melbourne was just 4 years old and was part of the "Port Phillip District" of New South Wales. John's Great-Grandfather conducted the choir at the official opening of St James, Melbourne's first Anglican church in 1842, now known as the "Old Cathedral" from when it supported an archbishop. John's Grandfather went to St James School and later sang in the choir of St Peter's Eastern Hill. John's daughter has had much experience in singing in and conducting choirs at school, and here in Canberra John's "Organ & Choral" program seems to be part of that tradition!
